### IMPORTANT TIPS

This newsletter we are sharing some important tips and information of items that are new or that we see in the field on a regular basis.

- ◇ If you have been to the DCF website lately you probably noticed a lot has changed. The navigation is very different and may require some time to get used to the new layout. We suggest for ease you go directly to [www.myflfamilies.com/childcare](http://www.myflfamilies.com/childcare).
- ◇ When doing fire drills with the children, once they are in their meet up spot outside, please stop to make sure that spot is not in the way of any emergency vehicles that would be there in a true emergency. If you need to meet up at the spot first and then move them to a safer, more out of the way location, that can be done also. [Here is an informative article](#) about how to ace your fire drills.
- ◇ Please be sure all [indoor & outdoor checklists](#) are being completed daily (on the days you are open) and that it is fully documented. These records must be kept for 12 months.
- ◇ Refrigerators that have temperatures showing on the outside door of the fridge must say the words 'actual temperature' as one of the choices for that temperature to be used in the inspection. If your door does not show the 'actual' temperature, you will need to keep a thermometer in your fridge and freezer for inspections.
- ◇ Please be sure you are sending in a current clearinghouse roster when you send in your license renewal packet. Here are the steps of how to obtain one:
  1. [Log into the Clearinghouse here](#)
  2. Go to 'initiate screening'
  3. Put in your social security number or last

name and click on 'search'.

4. Once a profile comes up, scroll to the bottom and click 'Add Employment/Contract Roster'.
  5. Follow the prompts to input information for owners, household members, substitutes and employees.
  6. To check and print your roster, go to the top of the profile and click on 'Employee/Contractor Roster'
- ◇ We have had a lot of questions about the clearing house and all the different terms related to retain date, renewal dates, etc. We now have an FAQ on our website that may answer some of these questions for you, but the most important thing is to keep your roster up to date: [Clearing-house Renewals FAQs.pdf \(myflorida.com\)](#)
  - ◇ Please be sure that a handwashing sign is hung by ALL handwashing sinks. You can print them here: [handwashing.pdf \(floridahealth.gov\)](#)
  - ◇ And finally, a reminder that the in-service training for the 7/1/22—6/30/23 is ending. Be sure you have completed your 10 hours of in-service training by June 30, 2023.

## Florida's Child Car-Seat Laws

Did you know that any child under five years old must be seated in a federally approved, child car-seat? Failure to follow these laws could result in a \$60 fine and three points against the supervising adult's driver's license.

### Florida law states:

- Children five years old or younger must be secured in a federally approved child restraint system.
- Children three years old and younger must use a separate car seat or the vehicle's built-in car seat.
- Children four to five years old and less than four feet, nine inches tall, must sit in either a separate car seat or a built-in child seat or a seat belt depending on height and weight.

Use the following car seat guidelines from the Florida Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles Department while driving with a child in your vehicle:

Birth to 12 months  
and at least 20 pounds

- Use a rear-facing child car-seat in the back seat of the car.

Twelve months and  
20 pounds to five years  
old and 40 pounds

- Use a rear-facing child car-seat in the back seat until your child outgrows the weight and height limit of the child car seat.
- Normally when children are older than one year and weigh more than 20 pounds, you can switch to a forward-facing car seat in the back of the car.

Five years old and 40  
pounds to six years old or  
four feet, nine inches tall

- Use a forward-facing child seat in the back seat until they reach the weight and height limits recommended by the manufacturer.
- Switch to a booster seat in the back of the car.

Six years old or four feet, nine  
inches tall to 12 years old

- Use a booster seat in the back seat until your child is big enough to use the car's seat belt.
- At 13 years old, your child can sit in the front seat of your car.

Please contact your local police or fire department for additional information on vehicle safety for your child.

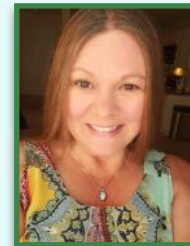

## NEWS FROM EPIDEMIOLOGY Summer Water Play Safety—2023

As the temperatures rise and the sun shines, water play may become a daily activity. The Florida Department of Health in Pinellas County (DOH-Pinellas), would like to remind providers of possible diseases that may be transmitted through untreated water.

Swimming related illnesses occur when someone ingests contaminated water from sources such as swimming pools, splash pads or household hoses where a water main break might have occurred. These diseases can be spread when someone who is ill enters the water. Other water related illnesses can be caused by germs that naturally live in water and soil. These can be spread when chlorine or bromine and pH levels are not high enough to kill off germs<sup>1</sup>.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), reports the most commonly reported water related illness is *Cryptosporidium* “Crypto” which is caused by a parasite<sup>2</sup>. Crypto can be spread from person to person, animal to person, through contact with contaminated water or by swallowing contaminated water or food. Outbreaks of Crypto are most common in childcare facilities during the late summer/early fall months but can occur at any time of the year. DOH-Pinellas typically sees increases in cases between June and September<sup>3</sup>.

The best way to prevent illness is to not allow children who have experienced diarrhea in the past two weeks into the water. Swimmers should also keep water out of their mouth when swimming or playing. Disinfection of the water source is important to prevent illness; however, one CDC study found that more than 10% of routine inspections of public pools, spas and splash pads led to immediate closure due to improper chlorine/bromine or pH levels<sup>1</sup>.

DOH-Pinellas recommends excluding ill children from care until 24 hours after symptoms have resolved without the use of medication. For questions or to report clusters of illness, please contact DOH-Pinellas Epidemiology Program at 727-824-6932.

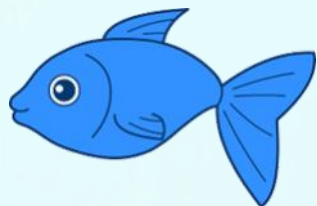
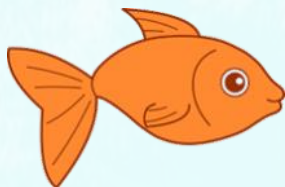


## Creative Corner

Here is a fun and cute spring craft from  
'Glued to My Crafts'

### Fish Handprint Puppets



#### Craft Supplies Needed:

1. Scrapbook paper or cardstock paper
2. School Glue
3. Jumbo Popsicle Sticks
4. Medium wiggle eyes
5. Basic craft scissors
6. Pencil or Pen

#### Directions:

- Trace the child's handprint/ on to the paper and cut the design out with the scissors. Repeat for however many handprints you want.
- Cut heart-shaped lips out of orange or red cardstock and glue them to the palms of the cutouts.
- Glue wiggle eyes on the fish
- Children could decorate the fish however they'd like using glitter, rhinestones, sequins, markers, etc.
- Let dry completely and then glue popsicle sticks to the back. Once the glue is completely dry your fish can have fun 'swimming'!
