#### FAMILY CHILD CARE HOMES FALLEDITION

Pinellas County License Board (PCLB) Website This is just a reminder that if you have internet access, you can go to our website, <u>www.pclb.org</u>, to access our updated forms. On our home page on the left -hand side, click on <u>Family Child Care Homes Forms</u>. Using updated forms and filling them out correctly will help you to maintain compliance. All forms are listed alphabetically.

#### **Background Screening Dates**

It is the provider's responsibility to know when a 5-year screening is due for themselves, any household member, substitutes, and employees. In order to keep your Clearinghouse account active, please log in every 2-3 months, pull up you're screening and log back out. This will help you to avoid having to re-register in 5 years due to inactivity on the account.

### BACKGROUND SCREENING - WHAT DOES "RETAINED PRINTS EXPIRA-TION DATE" REALLY MEAN?

There are 2 dates on your clearance letter for background screening that you need to track:

1. <u>Eligibility Determination Date</u> – Per licensing regulations, that screening date is good for 5 years.

2. <u>Retained Prints Expiration Date</u> – That date means that your fingerprints will only be retained in the Clearinghouse until that expiration date. As of that date, your fingerprints will no longer be retained in the Clearinghouse. The Clearinghouse and means that your means the second s house only maintains your fingerprints for 5 years.

If your roster is updated, you will receive notification by email when finger-prints are getting ready to expire in the Clearinghouse. The notices will begin 60 days prior to expiration. This means that as of the retention date, the fin-gerprints will no longer be in the Clearinghouse for you or any household member, substitute or employee. The person will have to be re-fingerprinted paying the full price. Please be sure that you are tracking the retention date so that you can do a resubmission and pay a lower cost (approximately \$42.00). If you, a household member, substitute or employee worked in the health care you, a household member, substitute or employee worked in the health care field and was fingerprinted for that job, the retention date is based on when they were fingerprinted for that job. So, please look closely at your clearance letter and the Retained Prints Expiration Date.

**Delinquency Screenings:** If you submit a delinquency screening for a house-hold member between the ages of 12-17, be sure to notify the Child Care Licensing office of the child's name and date of birth and when it was submit-ted. The results come directly to the CCLP office, but the above information is needed to pull up the screening results.

#### Preparedness

There are some reminders that we would like to share to help you protect your family and your Family Child Care Home business now that we are at the height of hurricane season. Be sure that you have a personal safety plan in place for you and your family. If at any time your home or property sustains damage from a natural disaster, fire, or other event, the License Board staff must be notified within 24 hours as to the status of your home. If your Family Child Care Home closes temporarily, prior to re-opening, the License Board staff must inspect to ensure health and safety standards are met. Have you thought about what would happen if your home was damaged and you could not open your Family Child Care Home? Where would your child care children go for care? The Pinellas County Child Care Licensing Program office is open Monday through Friday from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Although I am hopeful there is never a reason for you to use our

after-hours service, there is one available in the event that you do. The system allows you to leave a message for a return call on the next business day when calling outside of our office hours. I am aware that most of your Family Child Care Homes have extended hours to accommodate the families you have enrolled and emergencies can happen at any hour of the day. If the call is urgent in nature and cannot wait until the next business day for a return call, there are instructions in the after-hours message that will allow you to contact someone right away.



Our office hours are separate from our operating hours. Please note, your Family Child Care Home could receive an inspection visit during any of your operating hours. "Office hours" refers to the hours our office personnel are available to take calls.

Our Licensing Specialists are very dedicated to their jobs and will work the hours necessary to fulfill their inspection responsibilities.

I hope this information is helpful and allows for better communications between PCLB and you as a provider.

### **NEWS FROM EPIDEMIOLOGY**

### **Monkeypox Infection and Prevention**

Since May 2022, the United States has been experiencing an outbreak of monkeypox. As of August 18, over 1,300 cases have been reported in Florida. While the case data collected currently shows transmission is higher among men who have sex with men, anyone can catch the virus through close face-to-face or skin-to-skin contact. Furthermore, there have been confirmed reports of children being infected following close contact, which includes holding, cuddling, feeding, as well as through shared bedding and utensils, from a caregiver or household member. Recently, health officials in Illinois investigated a daycare worker who was diagnosed with monkeypox and potentially exposed several children to the virus.



Monkeypox is a disease caused by infection with the monkeypox virus. Symptoms normally last for 2-4 weeks and include fever, headache, swollen lymph nodes and rash

that looks like pimples or blisters. Individuals who are infected are likely to survive, however, people with weakened immune systems, children under 8 years of age, people with a history of eczema, and people who are pregnant or breastfeeding may be more likely to get seriously ill. Monkeypox is spread through direct contact, respiratory droplets and less commonly contact with objects that were touched by an infected person.

People who think they have monkeypox or have had close personal contact with someone who has monkeypox should visit a healthcare provider to help them decide if they need to be tested. Treatment and vaccines are available for monkeypox. The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) has ap-



proved the Jynneos monkeypox vaccine to be given to people under the age of 18 who have been exposed to the virus, including children who were exposed to a known case.

Despite the mode of transmission and increasing cases, risk for spread in a childcare center is still low at this time. General hygiene guidelines such as sanitizing, disinfecting, and excluding children and staff for signs or symptoms of illness are still effective ways to prevent disease transmission in childcare centers. Continue encouraging hand hygiene practices and cough and sneeze etiquette. It is also a good idea to develop and follow a regular cleaning and disinfecting schedule for the entire facility, including toys and shared bedding.
