Shaken Baby Syndrome and Abusive Head Trauma

Shaken baby syndrome is completely preventable. Taking care of a baby can present challenges. It is important to remember that it is never acceptable to shake, throw or hit a baby.

Preventing, recognizing, and responding to, and reporting Shaken Baby Syndrome and Abusive Head Trauma (SBS/AHT) is an important function of keeping children safe, protecting their healthy development, providing quality child care and educating families. Abusive head trauma can occur in children up to 5 years of age; infants less than one year are at greater risk of injury. Shaken baby syndrome can lead to serious conditions including:

Brain damage, problems with memory and attention, cerebral palsy. Blindness or hearing loss. Intellectual, speech or learning disabilities. Developmental delays

Infant crying is normal behavior, which improves as a child ages. As caregivers you are now required by law to have a written policy and procedure to identify and prevent shaken baby syndrome and abusive head trauma. Your policy/procedure should have proactive strategies to manage stress levels and appropriate responses to a crying child.
