As I write this, we are coming up on one year since our world turned upside down and life as we knew it changed drastically. While we all are suffering from "COVID fatigue," it is more important than ever that we keep doing what we know will minimize transmission of the coronavirus. Small groups, not mixing classes, keeping classroom staff changes to a minimum, and adult mask wearing while inside, are all components we should follow. While these are not Licensing Regulations, they are what will help us to defeat this virus.



There are a few newer Licensing Regulations that I want to remind you of. In April, all parents/guardians must once again receive the Distracted Adult Driver flyer. Whether you choose to provide them a hard copy or send it electronically by email, our Licensing Specialists will need to see in some way

that it was received by parents/guardians for all children enrolled during the month of April.

You must keep your Clearinghouse roster up-to-date. You only have 10 days after you hire someone to put them on your Clearinghouse roster and 10 days after they leave your employ to remove them. The Clearinghouse roster is going to become crucial in 2021, as many fingerprint retained dates expire this year. If you have someone on your roster, you will receive notification prior to the retained date to have them re-screened. This is a much less costly option than you will face if their fingerprint retained date passes before you rescreen. If that is the case, your employee will have to be completely re-fingerprinted at a much higher cost.

If you are licensed as a School Age Center, you have new requirements for First Aid and CPR certification coverage. By June 2021, the requirements will be different than they are now. Please refer to page 68, 4, of our current Licensing Regulations Governing Pinellas County Children's Center for the specifics. The requirements for Day Nursery programs will not change until December 2021, and will be different than those for School Age programs.

I also want to remind you that you must report to the Department of Health's Epidemiology unit any cases of COVID-19 that either staff or children at your center have or have been exposed to. They will make the determination of what is best to limit the effects and keep others safe. They are very busy people these days and will get back to you as soon as they can. Please be sure to have as much complete information as possible to give them when you call **Epidemiology at 727-824-6932**.

Most importantly, I want to take a moment to thank our child care heroes who have worked tirelessly to help the children in care have as productive and positive experiences as possible. The additional stresses of daily life that we now face weigh on us all, and the fact

that children have the opportunity to play with other children, laugh, sing, play outside and feel nurtured is priceless. I also want to thank our staff of dedicated Licensing Specialists and Administrative Staff who have constantly encouraged and supported providers and each other. I could not be more proud to be their co-worker.

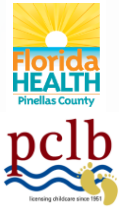

2020-21 Influenza Season: Mid-Point Summary

As the 2020-21 influenza (flu) season approached, health experts worried about the potential impact of another respiratory illness on top of the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic. An active flu season could overburden the healthcare system, strain laboratory capacity, and increase the risk of catching both diseases at once.

As we have hit the midpoint of the 2020-21 flu season, Pinellas County has seen unusually low flu activity. Emergency department visits for flu remain below levels expected for this time of year. Overall, flu testing and the number of positive flu results are also unusually low. So far this season, no childcare facilities have reported flu outbreaks among attendees or staff. These mild trends have also been observed across Florida and the US.

Influenza and the novel coronavirus are both respiratory

viruses, so mitigation measures for COVID-19 (such as hand washing, mask wearing, and social distancing) are also effective against flu. While these measures alone have not been enough to control COVID-19, they are likely playing a major role in controlling flu because it is less transmissible.

While flu activity is unusually low at this time, it could still increase in the coming months. Childcare facilities are at an increased risk of a flu outbreak due to the nature of the setting – children spending hours together, touching surfaces, objects and each other. Vaccination is the best protection against flu and it's not too late to get vaccinated for this season. To help reduce the spread of flu, childcare facility operators should encourage their staff and attendees to get the annual flu vaccine.

If you have more than one case of flu or flu-like illness in your childcare facility, contact DOH-Pinellas, Epidemiology Program at **727-824-6932** to report the outbreak and receive consultation on how to stop the spread of the disease.

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RECORD KEEPING FOR CHILDREN'S CENTERS

Is a four and a half (4 1/2) hour training comprised of an overview of regulations regarding record keeping including personnel, children, and facility records. Participants will receive a training packet that includes required and optional forms and learn practical ideas for setting up and maintaining files in order to be in compliance with regulations. This training is appropriate for prospective or new owners/directors and as an update for current child care personnel with record keeping responsibilities. A certificate documenting four and a half (4.5) hours of annual inservice training will be issued.

DIRECTOR'S ORIENTATION FOR INFANT CARE

Is a three (3) hour training comprised of regulations pertaining specifically to infant care and best practices in caring for children from birth to 2 years of age. Participants will receive a training packet that includes a copy of the Infant Standards, required and sample forms, and brochures. This training is required for directors who plan to start an infant program. A certificate documenting three (3) hours of annual inservice training will be issued.

DIAPERING 101: BEST PRACTICES

1



The diapering surface must be impermeable (waterproof) and have no rips or tears.

2



Be sure to have the wipes, clean diaper and anything else needed within reach.

3



Place the child on the diapering table.



4



Change the child's diaper.



5



Dispose of the dirty diaper in a closed, inaccessible diaper pail.



6



Wash the child's hands & your hands.



7



First: Clean changing pad with soap & water.
Next: Sanitize or disinfect changing pad and be sure to follow mixing/strength and contact time directions.
Last: Let dry for the correct amount of time.



8

Children must be attended to at all times while on the diapering table.
No straps are allowed!

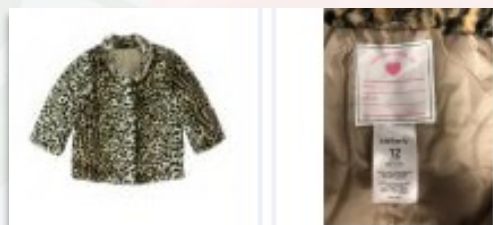

This activity went well, but next time we will endeavor to drop Humpty Dumpty from a greater height!

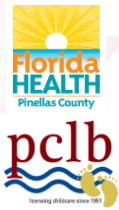
