s I write this, we are coming up on one year since our world turned upside down and life as we knew it changed drastically. While we all are suffering from "COVID fatigue," it is more important than ever that we keep doing what we know will minimize transmission of the coronavirus. Following CDC guidelines and adult mask wearing while inside are not Licensing Regulations, but they will help us to defeat this virus. I know that many of you are not allowing parents in your home, you have children wash their hands immediately upon arrival, and you are spacing cots more than just the required two feet apart.

I also want to remind you that you must report to the Department of Health's Epidemiology unit, any cases of COVID-19 that either you, household members, or children/parents have been exposed to or have tested positive. They will make the determination of what is best in order to limit the effects and keep others safe. They are very busy people these days and will get back to you as soon as they can. Please be sure to have as much complete information as possible to give them when you call **Epidemiology at 727-824-6932**.



There are a few newer Licensing Regulations that I want to remind you of. In April, all parents/guardians must once again receive Distracted Adult Driver information. Whether you choose to provide it by hard copy or electronically by email, your Licensing Specialist will need to see in some

way that it was received by parents of all children enrolled during the month of April.

Please remember you must keep your Clearinghouse roster up-to-date. The Clearinghouse roster is going to become crucial in 2021, as many fingerprint retained dates expire this year. If you have someone on your roster, you will receive notification prior to the retained date to have them re-screened. This is a much less costly option than you will face if their fingerprint retained date passes before you rescreen. If that is the case, you, a household member, a substitute or an employee will have to be completely refingerprinted at a much higher cost. Do not resubmit the renewal prints prior to 60 days of expiration; the Clearinghouse will not recognize them and you will have to pay again to resubmit within the 60 days.

If you are a licensed Large Family Child Care Home, I want to remind you that as of 6/12/21, your employee must have current CPR/FA certification.

I also want to remind you that when you have an "open child abuse investigation" involving the Family Child Care Home or Large Family Child Care Home, it shall be reported to the Child Care Licensing Program (CCLP) within 24 hours or the next business day upon initial knowledge of the investigation." VII.B.1.b.

Most importantly, I want to take a moment to thank our child care heroes who have worked tirelessly to help children in care have as productive and positive experiences as possible. The additional stresses of daily life that we now face weigh on us all, and the fact that children have the opportunity to play with other children, laugh, sing, play outside and feel nurtured is priceless. I also want to thank our staff of dedicated Licensing Specialists and our Administrative Staff who have constantly encouraged and supported providers and each other. I could not be more proud to be their co-worker.

NEWS FROM EPIDEMIOLOGY

2020-21 Influenza Season: Mid-Point Summary

As the 2020-21 influenza (flu) season approached, health experts worried about the potential impact of another respiratory illness on top of the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic. An active flu season could overburden the healthcare system, strain laboratory capacity, and increase the risk of catching both diseases at once.

As we have hit the midpoint of the 2020-21 flu season, Pinellas County has seen unusually low flu activity. Emergency department visits for flu remain below levels expected for this time of year. Overall, flu testing and the number of positive flu results are also unusually low. So far this season, no childcare facilities have reported flu outbreaks among attendees or staff. These mild trends have also been observed across Florida and the US.

Influenza and the novel coronavirus are both respiratory

viruses, so mitigation measures for COVID-19 (such as hand washing, mask wearing, and social distancing) are also effective against flu. While these measures alone have not been enough to control COVID-19, they are likely playing a major role in controlling flu because it is less transmissible.

While flu activity is unusually low at this time, it could still increase in the coming months. Childcare facilities are at an increased risk of a flu outbreak due to the nature of the setting – children spending hours together, touching surfaces, objects and each other. Vaccination is the best protection against flu and its not too late to get vaccinated for this season. To help reduce the spread of flu, childcare facility operators should encourage their staff and attendees to get the annual flu vaccine.
