BACKGROUND SCREENING: WHAT DOES RETAINED PRINTS EXPIRATION DATE REALLY MEAN?

There are 2 dates on your clearance letter for background screening that you need to track:

- 1. Eligibility Determination Date Per licensing regulations that screening date is good for 5 years.
- 2. Retained Prints Expiration Date That date means that your fingerprints will only be retained in the Clearinghouse until that expiration date. As of that date your fingerprints will no longer be retained in the Clearinghouse. The Clearinghouse only maintains your fingerprints for 5 years.

If your roster is updated, you will receive notification by email when fingerprints are getting ready to expire in the Clearinghouse. The notices will begin 90 days prior to expiration.

This means that as of the retention date, the fingerprints will no longer be in the Clearinghouse for you or any household member, substitute or employee. The person will have to be re-fingerprinted paying the full price at the vendors. Please be sure that you are tracking the retention date so that you can do a resubmission and pay a lower cost (approximately \$42.00).

If you, a household member, substitute or employee worked in the health care field and was fingerprinted for that job, the retention date is based on when they were fingerprinted for that job.

So, please look closely at your clearance letter and the Retained Prints Expiration Date.

NEWS FROM EPIDEMIOLOGY

Hand, Foot, and Mouth Disease

and, Foot, and Mouth Disease (HFMD) is a mild, very contagious, viral illness often seen among children under five years of age. People can be exposed to the viruses that cause HFMD through multiple routes, which allows the illness to spread quickly in childcare facilities. Learning about the disease and how to stop it from spreading are key to protecting others.

Signs and Symptoms:

Symptoms generally appear 3 to 6 days after a person is exposed. Symptoms begin with a fever, sore throat, malaise, and/or poor appetite. After 1 to 2 days, red sores or blisters can appear on the mouth, hands, soles of the feet, knees, elbows, buttocks, or genital area. Although more com-



mon in children, adults can become infected as well and should monitor themselves for symptoms.

How is it spread?

HFMD is caused by viruses that belong to the Enterovirus family and Coxsackievirus A16 is the most common cause in the United States. When someone is infected, these viruses can be found in nose and throat secretions, such as drool and nasal mucus, blister fluid or stool. The virus can be spread through respiratory droplets when an infected person coughs or sneezes. Exposures may occur through close contact such as kissing, hugging, or sharing eating utensils or cups of an infected person. The virus can also be transferred on surfaces, including doorknobs and toys.

. What to do if you if you are sick?

Those infected with HFMD are most contagious during the first week of illness. It is important to stay home and not attend school, work, or other group activities. Follow up with a healthcare provider as needed. Providers can often diagnosis the illness by considering the age, symptoms, and appearance of the rash. Most individuals recover within 7 to 10 days.

It only takes a few steps to help stop the illness from spreading to others:

Wash your hands:

Adults and children should wash their hands thoroughly throughout the day.

Wash hands after using the bathroom, after changing diapers, after blowing your nose, or coughing or sneezing, and before and after caring for someone who is sick.

Try to avoid touching your eyes, nose, or mouth.

Avoid touching the blisters or scabs and keep those areas covered.

Clean and disinfect:

Clean and disinfect frequently touched surfaces such as toys, doorknobs, tables, and eating utensils.

• Notify and monitor:

Notify individuals who were exposed to an infected person.




