




Breakdown: FY Comparison by Month...






Breakdown NOW: FY21-22 TD Comparison by Full Weeks...






Breakdown: Pediatric Weekly Counts...THEN






Breakdown: Pediatric Weekly Counts...NOW








Breakdown: FY Comparison by Month...












Where are transports coming from (FY21/22)?
















COSSAP/Operation PAR Data Compilation 9-1-1 Suspected OD Transport History - Incidents Matching CY 2020 thru September 15, 2022








Law Enforcement in Action - # of Incidents...






Law Enforcement Incidents by Month...






Law Enforcement Incidents by Month...Trending






Law Enforcement Administrations by Month...
















Q2 2022 Suspected All Drug Overdose ED Visits Demographics²




Overdose-Related Emergency Medical Services (EMS) Responses³

Overdose-Related Fatalities⁴



- The information from the graph above was retrieved from Florida's syndromic surveillance system, the Electronic Surveillance System for the Early Notification of Community-Based Epidemics (ESSENCE-FL). The information in the graph displays opioid- and stimulant-involved ED visits at Pinellas County facilities. It is important to note that some visits may not be directly related to opioid or stimulant overdoses at time of visit. Individuals who have a history of opioid or stimulant dependence admitted to the ED are also included in the numbers above. Additionally, ED data are provisional and may change as new information is received.
- 2. Graphs display the demographics of all drug-involved ED visits at Pinellas County facilities retrieved from ESSENCE-FL. Within the race/ethnicity chart: Other, Non-Hispanic includes those who reported their race as American Indian/Alaska Native, Asian, Multiracial, Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander or Other; Hispanic includes all races who reported their ethnicity as Hispanic; those who reported their race and/or ethnicity as Unknown were excluded.
- 3. Graph displays data retrieved from Biospatial and shows EMS response calls for suspected opioid overdoses and naloxone administrations.
- 4. Graph displays data captured from death records retrieved from ESSENCE-FL and shows drug and biological substance poisoning deaths (X40-44, X60-64 and Y10-14).

- Office of Overdose Prevention has attended 30 outreach events to date.
- Naloxone training: 79 individuals across 4 different organizations to date.
- 129 Red Boxes placed in Pinellas County.
 - Thanks to Pinellas County Harm Reduction Inc. for taking steps in placing red boxes in needed areas.

OD2A Update

- 🏂 Addiction Stabilization Unit grant awarded \$101,689 🏂
 - Purchase order is in place and awaiting approvals.
 - Funds will be directed to Operation PAR to continue weekend provider services for connection to care.
- 🏂 Florida Department of Health Opioid Overdose Prevention Program 🏂
 - CHDs to begin distributing naloxone 2022 *harm reduction method*
 - Standing order in compliance with section 381.887, Florida Statutes
 - Pilot program which includes 16 counties receiving 1,500 kits
 - (Baker, Bradford, Union, Franklin, Gulf, Gadsden, Gilcrest, Levy, Glades, Hendry, Hamilton, Hardee, Jefferson, Madison, Lafayette and Suwanee)
 - Distribution to remaining counties to follow

First Responders – Comprehensive Addition and Recovery Act

- Expands first responder Naloxone program and increases connections to substance use treatment services.
- Enhances current program additional training, increased community access to Naloxone and expanded Quick Response Team program.
- Outreach and wellness checks up to 90 days post overdose.

New 5-Year Funding

- NIDA funding of a national Center for Dissemination and Implementation at Stanford (CDIAS, Mark McGovern PI)
 - Northwestern/USF working with Pinellas County on <u>model-based</u> decision support to reduce overdose deaths. (Brown, Johnson, Vermeer, Hills; Choe, Clarke)
 - Technical Assistance, Training, Learning
 Collaborative, Dissemination of Findings



Using Local Data to Model Alternative Implementation Strategies

2K implementation strategies meet the National Ending **HIV** Epidemic Goal 90% Reduction in New HIV Infects in Chicago by 2030.


A model for HIV prevention in Chicago to illustrate our goals

Blue – Best Prevention Only


Green – Optimal Treatment + Prevention

Modeled incidence over time



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Where are we in the building process



In preparation of running experiments to the model we identified the following main intervention targets:

- Scale up of Narcan
 - Distribution
 - Dispersion
 - Use
- Scale up of treatment capacity
 - Capacity
 - Dispersion/access
 - Retention
- Increased linkage to treatment via:
 - EMS
 - Judicial system
 - ER

Are there additional intervention dimensions that we should be exploring?

- Differences by drug category?




- Overdoses based on Accident, Suicide, Undetermined
- All Overdoses, Opioids, Stimulants








2019–2021 Monthly Deaths from ASU_Opioids



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Overdoses


- Immediate <u>Increase</u> in ALL Drugs except Heroin with start of COVID
- Continued Elevation of Overdoses in ALL Drugs except Heroin
- Primarily
 - Opioids (Fentanyl, NOT Heroin)
 - Stimulants (mostly Methamphetamine)



Seized Drugs



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
Changes During 2018–2021 in Monthly Numbers of Seized Drugs Containing Opioids



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Seized Drugs

- On the order of 1K Seizures Per Month
- Mirror Image to Overdose Deaths
- Immediate Reduction in Seized Drugs
- Continued Reduction through 2021

• Many more Stimulants seized than Opioids
